



hen Riccardo Barthel and his wife, Daniela, built their Florence home, it was their dream to construct a tree house for their children in the grounds. It was only years later, when those children had kids of their own, that the idea was finally realised – albeit in a modified form. For the expanded family, the tree house now had to be multi-functional: part playroom, part guesthouse and part quiet refuge.

There was a problem, too: none of the Barthels' trees was strong enough to support it. So, with the help of architect Vincenzo Trupo, a tall, free-standing structure – accessed by a stepladder on one side and an iron staircase on the other – was built instead. Rusted iron and wood flooring give the impression of a tree house and add a rustic, relaxed feel.

Inside, the space feels larger than it is thanks to the simple decor, huge windows and glass doors. The main room houses a wood-burning stove and a double bed, behind which is a blackboard wall 'where guests can draw or express their thoughts,' says Riccardo. This separates the room from a kitchenette, while on the other side of the house, a mirrored bathroom creates the illusion of open space. A terrace looks out over the spectacular Tuscan setting, while kindergarten chairs sit around a sand box below, evoking the original concept of a children's play house.
